#### **Police**

After a probationary period you could explore areas such as child protection, the Fraud Squad, fire arms, dog handling and many more. ### Coastguard

As a coastguard you'll work for the Maritime and Coastguard Agency (MCA) helping to support search and rescue services to prevent the loss of life on the coast and at sea. There are a variety of roles including a coastguard watch assistant, coastguard watch officer or coastguard rescue officer volunteer.

#### **Routes to success**

If you choose to study uniformed protective services, there are a number of routes you can take to further your career such as:

### • Further study at university or college

You can look at foundation degrees or an NCFE level 3 qualification in uniformed services or policing. If you go to university there are a number of opportunities, including Professional Policing. Each uniformed service has their own entry requirements.

### Apprenticeships

As an apprentice, you'll complete a set programme of learning and earn a wage at the same time. This will provide you with a structured training period and a solid foundation of knowledge from which to progress to further career choices.

#### Entry level roles

An entry level role will give you the chance to work your way up through your chosen route whilst finding your feet, often developing and learning new skills.
